



Euromillions Lottery

Members of the public receive a letter in the mail with the envelope personally addressed with their correct name and postal address.

The letter indicates that it is from the vice president of International Promotion/Price Award of the Euromillions Lottery International of Madrid Spain.

The letter claims that winners are selected through a computer ballot system drawn from numerous countries as part of an international promotions program.

The letter notifies the receiver that they have won a lottery indicating a large sum of money that is deposited with a security company and insured in their name. In order to begin the lottery claim payment process a form requesting personal information including their full name, date of birth, place of birth, telephone number, nationality, occupation, sex, marital status, next of kin names, dates of birth, phone numbers and addresses, bank name & address and account numbers to be faxed to the organization.

The letter asks the receiver to keep this award from public notice until their claim has been processed and money remitted to their account (which will never be remitted) as part of a security protocol.
